“Parliaments, Parties, and Federations: Rethinking the emergence of modern political system in Eurasia”

The global imperial crises of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries led to profound reconfigurations of political organization across Eurasia, including the emergence of new parliamentary institutions, single-party regimes, and various forms of federal organization. When looked at through individual lenses, many of these phenomena were traditionally interpreted as deviant transplants of Western models. In contrast, through three case studies examining Japan, the Soviet Union, and China, this seminar explores how the political shape of modern states was co-produced through reinterpretations of both vernacular and globally circulating elements.
