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## **Revised disciplinary measures**

Under Japanese law, students who commit crimes and legal violations will be subject to the same punishments as ordinary citizens. In addition, the university may also subject such students to disciplinary measures as per its educational guidance policy. Criteria for violations and disciplinary measures are described in Tohoku University's Student Discipline Guidelines. However, as these guidelines were last revised more than 10 years ago, they did not reflect the current student living environment. Therefore, it was decided to revise them again, effective as of July 1 this year. All Tohoku University students are expected to respect the rights of others, observe Japanese law, use common sense, and act responsibly as members of the community.

#### Disciplinary measures

#### Reprimand

Reprimands are given to students who have been warned over a violation. Its purpose is to encourage them to reflect on their actions and not repeat the offense in the future. Suspension The student is forbidden from taking classes for a fixed period of time.

#### Expulsion

The student's right to study at Tohoku University is revoked, and the student's record of registration at the university is terminated.

Note: The extent of punishment will be determined after comprehensive consideration of the individual's case, their behavior after committing the violation, etc.

## Notice regarding part-time employers

According to the 11th Tohoku University Student Survey conducted last year, about 80% of Tohoku University students perform part-time jobs, indicating that work plays an important part in student life. However, problems involving part-time work have been reported from around Japan. For example, recently a student from another university working at a restaurant was found to be giving unauthorized discounts to members of their sports club. Such behavior is not only bad for your employer, it undermines the community's trust in you, and by extension other students from your university. In the above-mentioned case, the club that the student belonged to was completely disbanded as punishment. If you are working at a part-time job, we hope that you will conduct yourself with politeness and honesty.

On the other hand, dishonest employers are also a problem in Japanese society. Such employers may sign up students for shifts that conflict with their classes or make them work unpaid overtime. An increasing number of students use the long vacations after final exams to work. We strongly recommend that you read the Ministry of Health Labour and Welfare pamphlet *Gakusei no Minasan he Arubaito wo Suru Mae ni Shitteokitai 7-tsu no Pointo* (Japanese only, "7 Things students should know before working part-time"). If you experience problems with your employer, do not keep them to yourself. Consult with someone you trust, a Labor Counseling Office, or the University Counseling Center.



## The drinking age is 20 in Japan! Please drink in moderation!

During the summer vacation, many students go on trips or club retreats. These almost always include parties, at which there will be many opportunities to consume alcohol. After a long semester, it's only natural that you'll feel ready to cut loose at such events, but this also increases the risk of drinking too much, potentially leading to serious accidents. Every year, there are a number of tragic alcohol-related student deaths in Japan. We ask that you please observe the prohibition on underage drinking. Do not drink if you're underage and never give alcohol to underage people. For students who are old enough to drink, please look out for and take care of each other when you're out drinking.

#### Please

DON'T drink if you're underage (under 20)

DON'T pressure others to drink (alcohol-related harassment)

DON'T participate in chugging/ calling (encouraging unsafe drinking) If a member of your drinking party starts to feel ill or falls unconscious,

never leave them alone; make sure at least two people are caring for them.

Turn them on their side and cover them with a blanket etc. to keep them warm.

### Call an ambulance immediately if:

- The person's temperature drops and their whole body is cold.
- They appear to be having trouble breathing. They are snoring very loudly.
- They do not respond, even if you call their name or shake them.

# Bicycle/motorcycle thefts

Between April and June there were 11 bicycle and motorcycle thefts on Kawauchi Kita Campus, with a particularly large number occurring after the May holidays. In most of the cases, the victims had not locked their vehicles because they were in a hurry and thought they would be safe on campus, or had left them unlocked for several days. To reduce the chances of having your own vehicle stolen, please observe the following three practices: (1) lock your bicycle/motorcycle with two different locks on two locations; (2) park in designated parking areas; (3) do not leave your vehicle in the same place for long periods of time. In particular, do not leave your bicycle or motorcycle on campus over the summer holidays.

The above chart shows numbers of traffic accidents involving Tohoku University students from April 2013 to March 2016. Between April and June of 2016, there were 10 accidents. Of these, 7 were serious enough that an ambulance had to be called —the largest number for this period in recent years. Over half the accidents were single-vehicle accidents, resulting from failure to obey traffic rules or speeding. In many cases, students have been found to be at fault for causing the accident. Therefore, in addition to mandatory Personal Accident Insurance (Gakkensai), we strongly recommend that all students enroll in Personal Liability Insurance (Gakkenbai) as well

Over summer vacation, you will probably have many chances to travel long distances for personal trips or club activities. If you will drive by car or motorcycle, please plan a schedule with plenty of time for rests, and avoid driving when fatigued or during inclement weather.

Example 1

A student on a motorcycle lost control and crashed on a curb while going downhill at high speed. The student had to be taken to the hospital by ambulance.

#### Example 2

A cyclist riding downhill at high speed collided head-to-head with another cyclist. The other cyclist lost consciousness and had to be taken to the hospital by ambulance.

## Advice from the University Counseling Center

With the end of first semester classes, you are probably feeling somewhat relieved to have some vacation time. We hope you will give your brain and body a rest, and enjoy some "me time." At the same time, summer vacation is a good opportunity to experience club retreats, part-time jobs, and travel. Trying out new things and pushing yourself to grow is important too.

However, please think about the below as you plan your summer activities.

- Try to keep on a steady daily rhythm ...... to ensure a smooth transition to second semester classes If you encounter problems, contact/consult the university at an early stage
  - ..... e.g. problems during part-time work, travel, etc.

Remember to moderate ...... e.g. when drinking at retreats or other group activities

The University Counseling Center will remain open during summer vacation (except during the Obon holidays). Feel free to contact us if you have any problems or concerns. Also, from this academic year we have appointed counselors who speak English.
